SUMMARY

Assembly District 29 is the 30th most racially disparate Assembly district in California. It ranks 54th out of 80 Assembly districts in outcomes such as employment, health insurance, and homeownership.

BACKGROUND

RACE COUNTS analyzed 31 indicators, across seven issue areas, for every State Assembly District and ranked districts by their outcomes and differences in those outcomes among racial groups.

Data sources for indicators include the California Department of Education, the California Department of Justice, the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey, and others. Understanding racial disparities in each district is essential to creating fair and effective policy. Data on racial disparities highlight where local systems fail to deliver equitable outcomes and reveal opportunities for targeted policies that close gaps.
