



SUMMARY

Senate District 27 is the 32nd most racially disparate Senate district in California. It ranks 14th out of 40 Senate districts in outcomes such as employment, health insurance, and homeownership.

BACKGROUND

RACE COUNTS analyzed 31 indicators, across seven issue areas, for every State Senate District and ranked districts by their outcomes and differences in those outcomes among racial groups.

Data sources for indicators include the California Department of Education, the California Department of Justice, the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey, and others. WHY THIS IS IMPORTANT

Understanding racial disparities in each district is essential to creating fair and effective policy. Data on racial disparities highlight where local systems fail to deliver equitable outcomes and reveal opportunities for targeted policies that close gaps. By examining these disparities, policymakers can work alongside their constituents to promote equity in their districts.

Across indicators in Senate District 27, Black and Latinx residents are most impacted by racial disparity, with the worst rates for 9 out of 31 indicators with available data. All races lose when systemic racism remains unchecked.
